The 41st Annual Flickertail Woodcarving show will again be held at the Doublewood Inn. The motel will provide tables, chairs, and a **table cover**. We will be able to set up Friday evening if the room is not rented, we will know about the availability when we get closer to the show date. I will try to communicate by **email** a couple of days before the show. Please bring a drop cloth to help retain the chips; a cloth drop cloth (like a old bed sheet) does a better job than a plastic drop cloth.

Harley Refsal Class Information

Harley Refsal is a specialist in Scandinavian-style, flat-plane carving — most often caricatures of farmers, laborers and common folk. Harley Refsal is a professor of Scandinavian Folk Art at Luther College in Decorah, Iowa. After graduating from Augsburg College in Minneapolis, MN, he studied at the University of Oslo; Luther Seminary in St. Paul, MN; and later returned to Norway, together with his family, to earn a degree in Norwegian Folk Art at Telemark University College in Rauland. During the



summer months, when not involved in regular classroom teaching at Luther College, and on many weekends throughout the school year, Refsal has regularly taught figure carving courses and workshops throughout North America, as well as Norway, Sweden and Iceland, for over 25 years.

In 1996 he was decorated by the King of Norway for his contributions to Norwegian and Norwegian-American folk art studies. Refsal has been commissioned on several occasions over the last two decades by Luther College and the city of Decorah to create carvings that have been presented to the King of Norway, the Crown Prince of Norway, national and international political leaders, as well as numerous Nobel Peace Prize laureates hosted by the College.

Examples of Refsal's work can also be found at the Vesterheim Norwegian-American Museum in Decorah, at Luther College, and in private collections throughout the U.S. and Scandinavia.

Refsal is the author of several books, including 'Art and Technique of Scandinavian-Style Figure Carving', many magazine articles, and is featured in an award-winning instructional DVD, 'Figure Carving Scandinavian Style with Harley Refsal'. You will be able to select a blank to carve from the assortment of blanks that Harley has available.

One blank is included in the registration fee.

Chain-Saw Carving Lessons

I was recently asked to carve a large cowboy holding a cup of coffee by a local coffee shop owner in Bismarck. Since I had never done any large chain-saw carving, I researched the internet to see what recommendations were out there and what tools were appropriate for chain saw carving.

I discovered that the carving of a large project follows the same steps as a small lap-held project, but on a much larger scale. I will show some pictures of the completed steps in my project, and sum up with the tips I would offer.





I began with a large cottonwood log, about 8 feet long by 27 inches diameter. I estimated the weight to be about 1500 pounds. It was loaded onto my trailer with a front end loader, and then when I got it home a neighbor with a front end loader helped me to set it upright so I could work on it. These two pictures show the original log and the step after it was shortened and the bark removed. I also intended to save the cottonwood bark, but discovered it was very thin and not worth saving.





I began with a 8-1/2" X 11" sketch drawn to scale and then marked on the log some cut locations from a side view and a front view. Then I went to work with a chain saw and roughed



out the project much like you would rough out with a band saw. I cut from side to side and front to back until I had lots of waste wood removed. The picture to the left above follows the removal of the waste wood. Then I began with a small chain saw to begin shaping and detailing the carving which is shown on the right. During the steps I continually marked the log with a marker to make sure I was cutting in the right places. This is similar to the way I carve smaller projects with hand tools.





Following the work with the chain saw, I used a right-angled grinder with a sanding disk to smooth the carving all over. The face was finished with large carving tools and a mallet. When the entire project was finished, I brushed on two coats of linseed oil as a preservative. Finally, I enjoyed a cup of coffee with my new friend (one who can't talk back).

What I learned from the research on the web really helped with the overall project.

- 1. There are small nose bars available for chain saw sculpture, although I didn't buy one for this project. If I do another carving like this, I will buy one of these. I found that with the bar I used, I could not turn the tip much inside the log, which is the same as using a large knife. A smaller knife with a finer point is easier to make scooping cuts same with a chain saw.
- 2. The type of chain you use makes a difference on the smoothness of the cuts. One type of chain I used has more cutting teeth, resulting in lesser teeth spacing. This makes smoother cuts, and less sanding.
- 3. Rough sanding disks are all that are necessary when using the right angle sander. 60 to 80 grit is fine enough.



- 4. Make sure you have a good dusk mask. You wouldn't believe all the dust created by the chain sawing and then the sanding. I also noticed some spalting of the heart wood. This indicates some decay was taking place in the early stages. I wouldn't want to breathe this.
- 5. Leather chaps and a leather apron would be very good to have. It would be easy to have a nasty injury using a large chain saw or grinder. I didn't have chaps, and touched my jeans with the grinder while it was slowing down but still moving, resulting in frayed jeans in a couple of spots. That's the style now among the younger generation. Too bad I'm not 40 years younger so I could still wear them. I'll be going to Wal-Mart for some more jeans.
- If you are going to transport a large log somewhere to carve, make sure you have something to load, lift and position it. I would not have been able to complete this without it.

I spoke with the people who I carved this for, and they told me they plan to display the coffee drinking cowboy in their coffee shop. If you want to see it in person, visit Cafe Aroma in downtown Bismarck. This cowboy is well traveled. It's already been to Las Vegas for the National Finals Rodeo. They used it to promote their coffee which is roasted right here in Bismarck.
