Monthly Meeting Minutes for Flickertail Woodcarvers November 6th, 2021, Trinity Lutheran Church

Becky B called the meeting to order. Fourteen members were present.

Project: Dale is responsible for today's project of hearts for the Cancer Society. Apropos of the activity, we just received a letter from Amy Gross at the Society thanking us for our continuing to provide them with hearts, giving a message of hope to the recipients.

Guests: None today.

Show and Tell: Doug E has recently visited the Galapagos Islands. He brought back a tortoise carved in Spanish cedar that was breath taking. He also brought back a lovely cup from Ecuador. It has decorations all around it made of barley.

Several people came with hearts to be collected.

Secretary's Report: The draft from October was sent out earlier. Dale approved and Eric G seconded.

Treasurer's Report: Warren gave information that there is \$6,418.01 in checking. In addition, he had money just received in the mail for various things including memberships. He recently paid out \$1,000 for the multipurpose room at the Career Academy.

Membership: Doug S was unavailable. Becky B said that we have new members from the beginner's class. We also have some new legacy members who are children of recently deceased members with tools who are interested in learning more about carving.

Property: Becky B reported the sale of one of our knives, leaving us with five 50th anniversary knives that can be used as special gifts, as well as mugs, patches and stickers. In addition, we have several medium size shirts left, and a few hats. All except the knives were available for sale at the Annual Show.

Library: Cliff laid out the books he has recently been given for us to look at during the meeting. Most are from Ron Torgeson and they are marked as donated by him, which is a practice Cliff is going to continue with any book that is offered to us. Cliff made an addendum sheet of all the new items.

He also has some years' worth of magazines which he is going through before deciding what to do with them.

We are running out of space in the library, and have a number of VCR tapes that have been recopied to other media. A motion was made to send out an e-mail allowing anyone who wants one to have it, and then dispose of the remainder. It was seconded and passed.

Publicity: The Visitors Bureau wants to include our Annual Flickertails Fall Show in their publication of things to do and see in Bismarck for 2022. That's wonderful, but we are thinking of renaming the show to include the Woodturners.

Becky W will put meeting times in the newspaper. (repeat)

Historian: Becky B is about half way through Clara's old material and archiving it.

Facebook: Eric G is keeping up with current events, including adding photos of the tortoise and hearts from today's meeting.

Website/Instagram/Twitter: Becky B is also keeping up with current events. She reported on a location called sketchfab.com. It allows you to see an object like the you are carving in the round. So, for example you can pull up a wolf and turn it to look at the side or the back. The example the site gives you is sneaker. You can look around it and even inside it.

Buckstop Junction: Mike wasn't available.

Programs: The Winter Celebration will be on Jan 8 [later correction: changed to Jan 22]. Dale and Jen have offered their home. No Whittle-In will take place on Jan 1. As with the last celebration, it is an all-day event starting at 8:30 am in the morning and going through to an evening potluck. Come for the whole day or part of it. There will be a carving exchange after the potluck. Becky W will have a project for those who wish to do something different, or bring hearts or something

Dale has been occupied with obtaining carvers for the Spring Class in May.

The Fall Annual Flickertail Woodcarvers Show will be held on October 8-9 of 2022 at the Career Academy.

The show may have name alteration. We are trying to blend our club with the Woodturners club during the show. The Woodturners have their meeting on the Saturday we have our Show, but they could have their meeting and still be part of the show. Becky B and Becky W have gone to the Women in Woodturning Show to become more acquainted with the group.

One person Dale has contacted is Roger Bean, who is a character carver. He may be interested in conducting our four day session while his wife could do the weekend lessons in woodburning. (repeat)

Mike has taken over the Snow Snakes from Doug E. Last year we completed 50 snakes. There is a chance that this year there may be an additional classroom involved. The idea is that we will set aside two carving sessions for snakes, as usual, a little earlier in the season, and the rest can be done at home.

Other Program Scheduling: In December Becky W will do a Christmas tree. Ed will do a meeting on photo editing and Bob P will do a review on tool sharpening. Dennis will do two classes on war pony sticks. The second will involve painting them.

Becky B has a cute turkey blank as an extra carving, but asks that you actually want to make it if you tell her to create the blank. They are difficult to cut out.

New Business: 1) our new shirt order designed by Becky B, with a flickertail carving a flickertail, will go out Monday, November 8. We need an order of 30 shirts with the price the manufacturer has given us. Over 20 shirts have been requested thus far. We will make up the remainder by ordering for the club. Becky W reminded us that we have several M shirts, so the new shirts will be in L, XL, and 2XL.

- 2) We only have about five or so signs to put in lawns advertising the Fall Show. We need to price out about 20 so that we can have additional publicity regarding the show.
- 3) Becky B will be teaching a session of three classes found in the Enrichment Catalog for Continuing Education. (repeat)

Old Business: 1) Virtual Carving Classes. Something to think about. (repeat)

- 2) The Bismark Veterans Memorial Library wondered if we would like to arrange another display in 2022. Some ideas for a theme were suggested in common with the Spring and/or October classes. (repeat)
- 3) Becky B assembled a Fall Carving Course which appealed to a wide variety of people. The eight-week course is half over and has grown from 14 to about 20 participants. Most of the new joiners are friends or relatives of people already enrolled. There have been only two minor accidents, one in class and one outside of class. Both involved not wearing a glove. The sessions continue each Tuesday through November 30 from 7:15-9pm. Becky has instructors for each class but could use extra people to help out.

In addition: Further, we have really cool business cards with Flickertail Facebook pictures on the back for free! (Free advertising and they're interesting as well). (repeat)

Having no further business, Ron H moved the meeting be adjourned which was seconded by Eric G.

November 6th, 2021 Whittle-In

Members were nicely spread out among the tables. A few snakes from last time were completed and returned. Along the table at the side of the room, Cliff laid out the books the library had recently received. Most were from Ron Torgeson. Cliff has begun marking books we obtain with the name of the person who donated the volume. It's a good way to keep an idea of where we get our resources. Because we have gotten so many books and magazines lately, we are running out of room. We a number of old VCR tapes that have been recopied to DVDs or other media. If no one wants them, we will get rid of them to create more space.

For today's project, Dale had some hearts for carving, and he brought a variety of woods including white pine, birch, chip board, cedar, particle board, cottonwood bark, and basswood. A lot of people had their own hearts to modify as well. Doug E said we need about two hearts a day to keep up with demand and we have given over 1,700 of them. In keeping with our heart theme, Dale noted that we got a

The church doors were locked, but various people let others in. Many of the tables were taken up by beginners. Their project for this evening was carving Christmas trees. Becky W, Becky B, Eric G, and Eric T went around and helped the students. Other members helped as well. About six adults and a number of children were learning.

Some 10 members were present. Mike came with a pile of wooden blanks to make into snakes. The classroom teaching with the snakes has to do with Native American culture. It's one of those sets of lessons that you remember doing long after you're older, just because you had so much fun while learning. The children experience Native American customs and games, they get to paint and create their snakes and then they get to race them down a hopefully snow-covered hill. I can't remember for sure; I think last year we needed 50 snakes. If the corners are rounded off decorating them doesn't take too long.



Becky B called the meeting to order. Sixteen members were present, including three from beginner classes.

Project: Becky W had today's project, a spiral Christmas tree that could be made into an ornament or smaller for earrings. It was the second week's project for the beginner class.

Guests: None today.

Show and Tell: Warren brought a cottonwood bark carving of a face to experiment with finishes and stains before he completes the carving he started with Vic Hood.

Bob P chip carved a beautiful sleigh found in this month's *Woodcarving Illustrated*. He created a heat transfer pattern that he will give to anyone wanting to duplicate the design.

Eric T is working on a new project in the drawing stage. In butternut, it is a cape buffalo being attacked.

Secretary's Report: The draft from November was sent out earlier.

Treasurer's Report: Warren gave information that there is \$7,591 in checking. In addition, he has money just received in the mail for various things including dues. No bills are outstanding.

Membership: Becky B said that we have new members whose names need to be added to the e-mail rolls.

Property: Several gouges and thumb guards were sold at the beginners' class that will need to be replaced.

We have replenished the larger shirt sizes (L, XL, 2XL) with the new design in the shipment received by Becky B.

Library: Cliff laid out the four volumes Eileen recently gave him. They are marked as donated by her.

We are running out of space in the library, and have a number of VCR tapes that have been recopied to other media are extraneous and have no function. The tapes were laid out on the table and a couple of people took a few. The remainder were disposed of at the end of the meeting.

December 4th, 2021 Whittle-In

Becky Weisgerber had the project, a little Christmas tree, the larger version suitable for an ornament, the smaller, a pair of earrings. Not too difficult, it was the beginner's class assignment for their second week. Becky brought square columns of basswood in two sizes to use for the trees. Each end of the column sustains a carved tree. The tree can then be cut off the piece of basswood and painted.

Becky B brought the order of shirts we had purchased with the new flickertail logo. She laid them out on one of the long tables by color and size. The shades are a muted rainbow of grays, greens, pinks, purples, bricks and blues. There are a few extras in larger sizes to augment our low number of stored shirts. She had a list of those who requested what size and color, and made piles for each recipient. It was nice to receive an order of the shirts for yourself.

On another long table, Cliff O has aligned the VCR tapes for everyone's perusal before the end of the meeting, when they would be thrown out. Virtually no one has a VCR to listen to the tapes that way anymore. Besides the VCR tapes, there

were four publications that Eileen has offered to the library that were shown. Cliff will put her name in them as the donor.

Everyone was nicely spread out among the tables. Mike brought a stash of snake blanks for those who wanted to work on them. A few snakes from last time were completed and returned. He discussed Deft sprays from House of Color, and stained the carving in American walnut.
