ADENDUM: Bob Pedigo reported after the minutes were written that he was unable to do the song bird carving class as stated above.

Blue Bill Duck Decoy

Instructor: Dick Skauge, Ugly Duck Farms

We will be carving a 2/3 full sized blue bill duck decoy from a butternut cut-out. The decoy will have parts of it finished with a natural butternut finish, parts textured and parts painted. The butternut cutout will include a head and body. After carving the flat-bottom decoy, we will paint the bill, head and part of the neck, fading into the body, which will be showing the natural butternut wood. The tail may also have some texturing and painting. You can wood burn texture on the head and tail to add to the realism. We will shape the body and head. Add eyes and texture the head, part of the neck and tail. We want a smooth body, but may carve in some primary and tail feathers. We will paint the bill, the head and into the neck, and paint some of the tail to balance the look. We will finish the entire carving with a spray finish. You will need to bring hand held tools and different grits of sandpaper. Instructor has tools that can be used during class. We will use power only to drill eye holes. You may want to bring your wood burner to add texture in some areas. Dick will be acrylic paints and brushes

to use and sprays for the final finish. A \$20 materials fee for the cutout payable to Dick payable at the first class.

Minutes

March 21, 2009 Monthly meeting at Trinity Lutheran Church 10:00 am

Bob Matzke provided the carving project for the morning. The project was a very nice miniature Hooded Merganser.

President Perry Cook presided over the meeting. Attending the meeting were 14 members.

The minutes of the last meeting was read and approved.

Treasurer Ron Holtz reported a checking account balance of \$6,119. He has received \$75 from dues, \$250 from fees for upcoming classes as well as \$1,000 from the DWAC grant which have not been deposited. Expenses include \$900 for upcoming instructor fees and \$54 for newsletter postage expenses. Treasurer's report was approved.

Old Business:

It was again reported that the bird carving class that Bob Pedigo was anticipating to be held in April, 2009 has been cancelled.

New Business:

Librarian Doug Emerson has been updating the clubs library and noted that three books are unaccounted for and cannot be located. They are "Carving and Painting a Rainbow", "Carving a Realistic Head", and "Carving Indian Rough outs".

Since they have been unaccounted for and assumed lost, it was moved and seconded to discontinue showing them in the library index and not replace the books since there are more modern editions of the subject matters. Motion approved. Doug indicated that he will continue to update the library index and post the library index on the website.

Programs report:

With the cost of the wood increasing so much over the past year, Frank recommended we help out with some of the expense increase for the upcoming Intarsia class to be held on Friday evening, April 24 thru Sunday April 26. A motion to give the instructor an additional \$50 for the added cost of the wood was made, seconded and approved.

Frank reported that the Old West Town will be on display in Medora, ND, in May.

There are about 31 song birds selected so far for the display to be shown at the Bismarck Public Library in February, 2010. Frank showed a small information card that could be used to introduce and educate about each bird carving. We would like the information card to be consistent with each other which should indicate some unique item about each bird carving. See Frank if you have any questions about the information card.

Frank gave a short update on the fall show which is scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, November 7 & 8,. The featured carver this year is Carol Lee Boyd who specializes in carving on Cypress Knee wood. Frank also reported that the Doublewood Inn will



be increasing their rental fees from \$1,000 to possibly \$1,300. A second instructor for the show was discussed with several names mentioned. Frank will contact those mentioned to see if they would be available to teach a class.

A grant will be written within the next week for the spring, 2010, class. It was recommended that we try to get Dick Skauge to teach the spring class. The project that would possibly be carved is a standing miniature Canada goose carved in butternut wood.

Other business:

Bob Matzke asked if anyone is interested in teaching a class at the Hazen Arts and Craft show. Anyone interested in teaching the class could contact Bob and he could direct you to the proper person to line up the class.

Ron Torgeson received an invitation for the club members to attend the ND Council of Arts banquet that is sponsored by the Governors Awards for the Arts. Cost will be \$30/ticket. Contact Ron if interested in attending.

Stan Skarphol's wife donated some of Stan's woodcarving materials to the club. The items donated include some wood, a club vest, and

several other miscellaneous items. The items will be displayed and sold at the whittle-in on Tuesday evening, April 7, 2009. The proceeds from the sale will go to the Flickertail Woodcarving club.

There was no carving exchange at this meeting.

This was approved, not to exceed \$75.00.


Breaking News from the Library From your librarian, Doug Emerson

Theme for 2011 Woodcarving Show: Carousel Animals: Some of the animals will be included in a Merry-go-Round. The up-down mechanism will incorporate the rail-wave technique (the last working rail-wave merry-go-round is in Little Rock, Ark).

Club News

The Flickertail Woodcarving Club is excited to announce the scheduling of several woodcarving classes for 2010. All of the classes are partially financed with grants from the Dakota West Arts Council and North Dakota Council on Art. Contact Frank Koch.

On April 23-25, 2010, (class starts Friday evening) Dick Skauge, Lake Park, MN, will instruct the carving of a sitting Canada goose. The goose is about three-fourths size so it will need to be secured to the table and larger gouges will be required. If you do not have carving tools of this size, the Flickertail Club has tool sets that you can use throughout the class. The goose will consist of butternut wood with only the black areas stained and some wood burning on the head and tail (optional). The goose has a minimum amount of feathering and texturing. This would be an excellent class for people with little or no experience with large tools or the carving of a goose. Cost for the class is \$50 (blank included).

On June 18-20, 2010, Don Balfour, Harwood, ND, will instruct a class on air brushing birds, fish, and animals. Don has used an air brush on his woodcarvings for many years. You can see some of his work by checking his website. You will need your own air brush and compressor for this class. The main project will be the air brushing of a life size wood duck. The warm piece will be the air brushing of a walleye. Those of you that still have some unpainted walleyes lying around; this would be the time to remove them from the mothballs. You can air brush your carved Wood duck if it is the same as the ceramic wood duck. Don prefers that everyone in the class paints similar objects. Class size is limited to eight and the cost will be about \$60.

On October 4-6, 2010, Harley Refsal, Decorah, Iowa, will teach a class on flat plane woodcarving. Harley will do a second class on Oct. 7 -10, 2010. The classes on Oct. 7 & 8 will be all day while the classes on Oct. 9 & 10 (annual show dates) will meet in the morning only. Harley normally has a variety of blanks available so everyone can select the subject of their choice. Harley is recognized internationally as one of the best flat plane woodcarvers. He has done consignment woodcarvings for the president of the US and the king of Norway. You can sign up for this class after July 1, 2010.

You are cordially invited to the 11th annual Winnipeg Woodcarvers Weekend. A variety of woodcarving instructors from the USA and Canada volunteer their time and skills to conduct classes at this retreat style weekend. Without their dedication and support this event could not be held. Our goal is to promote woodcarving, bringing woodcarvers together in one place to socialize and focus on woodcarving. It is always a rewarding experience to participate in an event of this kind.

While 2010 brings the excitement of celebrating our 11th annual event, it also brings the challenge of cost increases. While we have no control over the governments and economies that have changed over the last 10 years, our goals have not. We strive to share our love of carving and have a good time in that sharing.

Winnipeg Woodcarvers Weekend is a not-for-profit event. All fees remain with the Winnipeg Woodcarvers Weekend and no person, club or organization benefits in any way. Annual registration fees are calculated to meet the expenses of that year. Registration fees increase when costs increase. For 2010 we have an increase of 5% in meals and rooms at St. John's College as well as rates at the Travelodge. An increase in the base cost also causes an increase in all of the applicable taxes. Our U.S. friends may find that it may be necessary to adjust their fees to accommodate the ever changing exchange rate between our two currencies.

As in past years, classes are filled on a "first-come-first-served" basis. It is important to indicate your 1st, 2nd and 3rd choices. You should register early to have a better chance of getting your first choice. St. John's College must adhere to strict food service regulations so we have a 124 participant limit.

Class confirmation/information will be mailed out at the end of March 2010. In the case of a cancellation, adjustments will be made to place participants in their class choice; however no adjustments will be made after April 20, 2010.

Should you withdraw from the weekend prior to April 13, 2010 your fees will be refunded minus \$15.00 for administration fees. Between April 14 and April 27, 2010 there will be a \$40.00 administration fee deducted and there will be no refunds issued after April 27, 2010.

Check-in begins at 3:00 p.m. on Friday, May 7, 2010. Classes start after the general meeting on Friday evening and end on Sunday afternoon at 3:00 p.m. to allow time for our travelling guests.

GENERAL INFORMATION

<u>U.S. Residents</u> – Crossing the Canada / USA Border and Current Dollar Exchange Rate

Entry into Canada from the U.S. remains the same - photo identification and/or birth certificates. <u>U.S.</u> residents and non-residents of the U.S. require a passport or approved document to enter the United States. If you are unsure what is acceptable, please check with the U.S. Government regarding the requirements. The exchange rate between the Canadian and U.S. dollar continues to fluctuate. Our fees reflect the current exchange rate. We reserve the right to adjust registration fees if any dramatic change in the exchange rate occurs.

<u>St. John's College</u> – has 95 <u>single</u> residence rooms on three floors designated for men and women. You can walk indoors from the residence to classrooms. International students attending classes occupy the rooms in the college but we have access to approximately 30 of these rooms for our weekend. All rooms are fully carpeted and furnished with a single, oak captain bed, desk, chair, armchair, sectional bookshelves and ample closet space. Sheets, blankets and pillows are provided but you must bring your own towels. Alcohol is permitted in the rooms. St. John's can accommodate participants who want extra nights before or after the weekend. The rate is \$34.00 CAN or \$28.00 U.S. per night, but meals are not included. Please indicate any extra dates on your registration and include full payment.

<u>Travelodge Winnipeg East</u> – a 10–15 minute drive to St. John's College. The Travelodge has an indoor pool, whirlpool, sauna, poolside rooms, bowling lanes, Video Lottery Terminals, dining room, lounge, free parking and free local calls. It is close to downtown Winnipeg and has access to excellent bus service. ***<u>Please note the following***</u> The Travelodge offers Winnipeg Woodcarving Weekend participants a reduced rate of \$82.99 (CAN) plus taxes per night. <u>If you require a room for 2010 you must call the Travelodge Winnipeg East directly at (204) 255-6000 or 1-800-578-7878 to book the room.</u> You must refer to the "Winnipeg Woodcarvers Weekend" to get the reduced rate and rooms must be booked before April 15, 2010.

<u>Other Accommodations</u> – other accommodation is available close to the University campus. Participants who wish to stay elsewhere are responsible to make their own arrangements.

<u>Meals</u> – meals included in the cost are Friday – dinner, Saturday – three meals and Sunday – breakfast and lunch. There is no discount for participants who choose to eat outside the College or bring their own food. Please advise us of any special dietary needs.

<u>Classes</u> – please list three choices in order of preference – you can only take one class during the weekend. Consider the skill level when selecting your class and avoid disappointment and register early. Keep in mind that class material costs are paid directly to the instructor and are payable in Canadian dollars unless agreed to by the instructor.

<u>Carving Display</u> – the display room is a very popular weekend feature. A secure room is available to display participants' work for all to enjoy Bring along some of your favourite work to display.

<u>Saturday Night Entertainment</u> – we will be continuing the Saturday night entertainment and cash bar. Let us know if you have any special talent that you would like to share on "Saturday Night Live".
