Deb Emerson presented a class discussion on the art of painting. Deb discussed various aspects about painting ranging from the different types of paints we can use for our woodcarvings, paintbrushes, and types of painting and shading.

Frank Koch gave a report on the upcoming Christmas party which is scheduled for Monday, December 9 at the Bismarck Elks club. Social hour will begin at 5:30 with the meal to start around 6 p.m. A signup sheet was being passed around. Those attending are asked to select their choice of 1 of 3 different meals. Anyone planning to attend the party and has not been able to signup should contact Frank as soon as possible. Cost will be less than \$20 per meal and will depend upon which meal is selected.

Frank also informed the members that the Career Academy is again reserved for the 2014 annual show in October, 2014. The only change will be that the banquet held on Saturday evening will be held at the Bismarck Elks club. More information about the annual show will be coming at a later date. The featured carver will be Chris Hammack who is well known as a cowboy caricature carver. Registration for the annual show and classes will be coming in a future newsletter.

Frank reported that Del Herbert will be teaching the class in the spring of 2014. He is a world champion carver of ducks. The class will be held on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, May 8-10, 2014. The project will be the painting of a pre-carved Green Winged teal and will be painted as a smoothie. The cost of the class will be \$75. Bob Pedigo indicated that he had received the most recent issue of Breakthrough magazine which showed some of Clark Shreibeis' fish carving which recently won awards at a recent national show.

Ron Holtz showed 3 carvings he has completed for show and tell. Frank Koch also showed a carving of a Christmas ornament that he recently completed. All members are encouraged to bring a sample of their carvings for show and tell as they are a sample of the talent within the club.

Larry Brewster's Stylized Christmas Tree Class



The DNA double helix of Watson and Crick has nothing on Larry's (far right) Stylized Christmas Trees with double spirals. I heard nothing but positive comments from the people taking the class. His 30 years experience in woodcarving definitely was demonstrated by Larry's detailed class and material preparation, as well as through his teaching methods and temperament. Originally, after taking a class from Frank Koch, Larry became a woodcarver. He joined and remained with the Flickertails Club because of the opportunity to take classes, guest carvers and camaraderie with fellow club members. A career civil servant, Larry was Director of Aging for the Department of Health and Human Services. Now retired, he lives in Hot Springs, Arkansas with his wife Cletus.

Larry favorite pastime is carving human caricatures because of the ability to be more creative. He likes to exaggerate at least two things on the figure such as hands and feet, and feels the more exaggerations carved into it the more improved the final product. The hardest thing for him is to fashion his figures to show action and movement. Usually carving two to four hours a day, Larry likes to grasp and feel what he is working on rather than using a holding device. He has recently transitioned to doing rough outs with gouges rather than a knife. Larry has about 10 tools he uses most of the time and recommends using the largest cutting implement possible that will get the job done, because it will yield the smoothest cut and best results. One of his toughest challenges is keeping his tools sharp and he warns to never sand before finishing the carving because the particles will quickly dull the knife.

He prefers painting with watered down acrylics translucent enough to see the wood grain in the final creation. And Larry advises to work fast and use a large brush otherwise the paint will start drying before you're done- ending up with splotches. A tip is to always

wet your brush with water before dipping it into the paint to avoid clogging the upper part of the brush with dry paint. His least favorite thing is painting waterfowl. Larry believes wood carving is a wonderful hobby, it keeps him active and through it he has become more observant. In addition he has learned sketching and anatomy. Larry has met many wonderful people and believes that because wood carving is such a solitary hobby, it is important to do some carving in groups because of the social aspects and also the sharing of information.

Quilting with Bonny Cook & Karen Pedigo



The tag team of Bonnie and Karen taught this year's quilting class at the annual Flickertail Show. The 2013 project was a very simple quilt using scrap material lengths arranged in a "jelly roll," and sewing them, end to end, with a straight stitch. Participants created striking stripped tops. These were to become such things as quilts, baby blankets, lap coverings or place mats. Next year the women plan to create elegant silk scarves. It all started 13 years ago for Bonnie and Karen. After taking a basic quilting class together, they came away excited and wanting to do more. Both like the creativity and the complexity of the different techniques including hem piecing, machine piecing, hand embroidery and putting fabric pieces together. Wall hangings and bed covers are other potential projects using quilting skills. Karen said the "sky's the limit" as far as the number of different methods.



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Bonnie and Karen enjoy the camaraderie of meeting new people, both locally and nationally, who have similar interests in the art of quilting. Travelling to quilt shows, seeing the different types of quilt art and learning new techniques are also part of the fun. Since beginning to quilt, they see the world and colors differently and employ more of the colors of nature in their work. And they use a color wheel for matching. As with wood carving, being disciplined and finishing the project are the most difficult aspects of the art for them. Other similarities to wood carving are the need to buy tools and supplies, and take classes to learn more. Bonnie and Karen think quilting is very enjoyable and can easily become an addiction, they feel quilting keeps you young, helps fulfill both the need to be around other people and the enjoyment of having something imaginative to do.

Del Herbert will be in Bismarck to teach a class on painting a full sized Green Wing Teal Hen on May 8-10, 2014. The duck will be pre-carved, may need some touchup in the head area. The painting will all be done with brushes. The painting will be on a smoothie (no carved detail). A list of suggested brushes and acrylic colors will be supplied later. The class will be at Trinity Lutheran Church. Class times will be from 8:30 am to approx. 4:30 pm each day. Cost of the class will be \$75 which will include the cost of the pre-carved duck blank (DWAC grant and North Dakota council on the Arts grant has allowed the club to discount the cost of the class).

Del has studied with many top wildlife sculptors and painters. He has competed in shows all across the US and Canada and has won over 150 "Best of Show" awards. Del has published articles in several national magazines (including Wildfowl Carving) and his first book "Championship Service Class Shorebirds" was published by Stackpole Publishing in 1998. The book has been republished along with a two part DVD on carving and painting an American Avocet. Del is in constant demand to judge shows and teach seminars all across the country and Canada. 



Decoy Carving Project

From May 2 through May 4, the Flickertails had a duck decoy carving class taught by John Cottingham of Gladwin, Michigan. He worked for the US Public Health Service in the National Disaster Medical System as a professional paramedic until retiring in 2011. One of his last missions was helping victims of Hurricane Katrina.

John is an avid hunter and visits several states at various times of the year including McClusky, ND for a few weeks most falls. He also enjoys training his hunting dogs for competitions and spending time with his family and young great grandchildren.

Although he carved his first decoys in 1964, John did not begin to get serious about carving decoys until about 20 years ago. He now carves decoys for shows and commercially and is a Master Carver.

John taught us that there are basically two kinds of ducks and nature's functional design is based on the how they feed. Puddle ducks are limited by the lengths of their neck in reaching sub-surface food. Their tails are high on the body and their feet are more forward. Diving ducks can feed deep below the surface. Their tails are much lower and the diving duck's feet are further back on the body.

Our project was a mallard drake duck. We carved the body out of cork and the head out of basswood. In addition a flat female mallard duck profile was carved out of pine. John's tip was to close your eyes and feel with your fingers for high and low stops. You will be able to detect things that you cannot see with the naked eye. We painted the decoy with wildlife acrylics from Hofcraft Crafts - Catalog found online. If you want to know the specific colors, I have the list provided by Frank Koch.

Initially John liked carving and found painting difficult. However by studying live birds, photographs and waterfowl anatomy, he eventually became proficient at painting and now thoroughly enjoys it. Two of his most difficult things are first starting a project and then knowing when to stop. For a long time, John had difficulty accepting that he was an artist. His wish, in giving these carving classes, is that 1 or 2 people from the class will take up carving decoys.



I have been taking some art drawing classes over at the local college and have learned some drawing techniques with applications to wood carving. The following commentary is a compilation of articles on drawing facial features that I read for the classes.


Head and Facial Proportions

Many people make mistakes when carving faces because they don't fully understand facial proportions. A simple formula exists to make sure your getting all the features in the right place. This procedure focuses on proportion, one of the important aspects when carving a head and face.

First draw a circle representing the cranium. Then bring a straight line down from the top of the circle to about double the length of the original circle. Next, you bring lines from the bottom of that line to the edges of the circle creating the shape of the face.



An alternative method and to add facial features follow the 11 steps listed below.



- **1. Know your proportions:** Heads are not perfect circles, and they are not perfect ovals either. You can think of them as kind of egg-shaped, with the tapered end toward the bottom. Of course this varies depending on the angle you are carving the head.
- **2. Refine the jaw line:** If you are drawing woman, this egg shape might do well to describe her jaw line, but men have a slightly more angular jaw, and flatter chin.

- **3. Eye placement:** Eyes are just about halfway between the bottom of the jaw and the top of the head.
- **4. Head radius:** A good rule of thumb is that the head is about 5 eyes wide and the gap between the eyes, where the bridge of the nose is located, is about the same width as the face on either side of the eyes.
- **6. Ear placement:** The tops of the ears are just above the eyes and the bottoms halfway from the eyes to the bottom of the jaw.
- **7. Nose:** In the example sides the nose extends a little past the inside corners of his eyes, but noses vary quite a bit in width.
- **8. Mouth:** The bottom lip of the mouth is halfway between the earlobes and jaw line. And the width extends to about the tris in the eyes.
- **9. Eyebrow placement:** The eyebrow is generally wider than the eye below it. Eyebrows tend to be thickest toward the bridge of the nose and taper toward the sides of the face, where they often also sweep downward. They vary greatly from person to person.
- **10. Hair placement:** The hairline is typically about 1/4 to 1/3 of the way from the top of the head to the eyebrows.
- 11. Side profile: Extend proportion to side profile to remain consistent.

These proportions work just as easily for a woman. Adjust the jaw line to be a little more rounded, make the ears a bit smaller and the neck a little narrower and you have a pretty convincing female face.

Since there was no scheduled project for the morning whittle-in, each participant concentrated on a carving of their own choice. President Doug Emerson opened the meeting with 13 members in

attendance. Secretary Warren Schlecht read the minutes from the March, 2014 meeting. Motion to approve the minutes was made and passed. Treasurer Ron Holtz reported there was \$2,285 in the checking account with all bills paid. Motion to approve the treasurer's report was made and seconded. Motion approved.

Doug reminded the club that the summer whittle-ins will be held on June 3rd, July 1st, and August 5th or the first Tuesday evening of each month at Shelter #4 in Sertoma Park (The June 3rd Sertoma Park whittle-in had eight carvers in attendance). He also informed the group that Trinity Lutheran Church is trying out serving a meal on the third Saturday of the month during the summer. If successful, they may wish to continue providing a meal the same time for the rest of the year. These meals would take place on the same days as our monthly Saturday meetings.

After some discussion as to how it would affect our monthly meetings, it was moved and seconded that the Club President be given the discretion to

adjust the meeting schedules as he sees fit. Depending upon the availability, meetings may be changed to a different date. Motion passed. We will have to wait and see what the church plans to do, and should know by our next scheduled monthly meeting on the third Saturday in September, 2014.

Quite a few members and non-members have expressed an interest in taking the class with the featured carver/painter at this year's annual show sponsored by the Flickertail Woodcarving Club. The group clarified the eligibility and sequence on who could take a class.

Current club policy is that club members have priority over non-members; however, individuals could sign up for membership at the same time they signed up for the class. It was moved and seconded that eligibility for class enrollment would first go to members who paid their annual dues prior to February 1st. Club members have two weeks after the official announcement of a carving class to signup to receive membership priority. Afterward the class will be filled with non-members for any open positions. Enrollment priority is based on firstly, paid up dues and secondly, the order in which the Program Administrator (currently Frank Koch) receives a check or cash. Motion passed.

NOTE: The registration for the spring carving class is announced in the January newsletter and the registration for the fall show and classes is found in the July newsletter.

In addition, members discussed the refund procedure for enrolled individuals who wanted to cancel out of a class. It was moved and seconded that in order to receive a full refund, the enrollee must cancel 60 days prior to the class (rather than 30 days which is the currently policy). The individual should try to find a replacement if possible. Motion passed.

Doug said the club was approved for another \$1,800 grant from the ND Council of Arts and we will also receive another grant worth around \$1,400 from DEWAC (\$3,200 total). The club uses grants to defray some

costs for classes we hold in the spring and fall of each year. Thank you to President Doug Emerson for doing all the grant writing and other work to obtain these monies for the club.

BAGA will be sponsoring the Capital Affairs craft show on the ND Capital grounds again this year. Dates are Saturday and Sunday, August 2nd & 3rd. Several members volunteered to help at the booth during the show. Bob Pedigo volunteered to coordinate the event. Anyone interested in helping out can contact Bob or Doug Emerson.

There were no items for show and tell and no further business so the meeting was adjourned.

We directed them to this month's Wood Carving Illustrated magazine which has an article on children that carve which includes their e-mail addresses. Hopefully they will follow up and start carving. This year had one of the largest attendances.

Bob Lavender's Downy Woodpecker Class

On June 4th, I headed north on Highway 83 with my camper to attend Bob Lavender's three day Downy Woodpecker carving class in Yorkton, Saskatchewan. I crossed over a bridge north of Washburn and my windshield was assaulted by a paintball like mass of squashed insects that were hatching from the creek below.

At the US/Canadian border, I learned that in addition to the War on Terror and War on Drugs there is a War on Wood. They were confiscating any timber with bark on it, for fear of insect infested wood crossing the border and spreading these pests that kill trees. Among other things, the border guard asked if I had any switchblades or butterfly knifes in addition to my



carving tools. I traveled through landscape much of which looked like it had been pressed out with a rolling pin. Canada however was on the whole more wooded and hilly than central North Dakota.

Nine women and three men attended the class which took place in a comfortable and well lighted room. Our project was two downy woodpeckers. The female poking her head out of a nest hole in a fence post and the male perched outside.

Lavender taught a fun and stress free class. He provided step-by-step

instruction and lots of individual attention. With his large hands, Bob proved to be virtuosos with a carving knife and paint brush. The atmosphere was relaxed with jokes and laughter. The women provided a large spread of goodies including Pönnukökur, an Icelandic pancake.



Bob is a Master Carver who carves birds for competition. His favorite is a raptor the (American) kestrel or sometimes colloquially known as the sparrow hawk. Lavender also sometimes carves fish, but largely stays away from carving mammals because he feels he does not know enough about their anatomy or habitat. Bob likes to work on several projects at once. This

gives him time to contemplate each work resulting in better final products with fewer mistakes.

In order to improve, Bob believes you must visit shows to see what other carvers are doing and compete. He participates in the open or advanced class. A carving can be entered in multiple shows, but it is only good for one year after completion. Lavender is seldom totally happy with a completed piece.

Getting ready for shows he also sometimes finds demanding. To compete at the world table you must, in advance, win two Master's Best in Show from two different years. In competition, habitat is also very important. Bob says there are no mistakes with any of the carvings that are entered on the world table and it's frequently the judges' preferences that decide the winner. We completed our projects and I headed for home. The US border patrol almost confiscated my carving project, but decided it was weathered wood and not bark covered.

This is one of the area's largest summer fairs, with arts and craft booths circling the capitol grounds, and various foods usually associated with fairs and festivals available on the

upper west parking lot. We were located in the shade near the cottonwood trees by the state library, between a group that spins their own wool to make their scarves, sweaters etc, and another that fashions pine needle baskets of different shapes and sizes.

Becoming an Outdoor Woman Carving Classes

During the weekend of August 8, 9, and 10 this year, I taught carving classes for the North Dakota Game and Fish Department to twenty-three women who learned to carve diamond willow walking sticks. This is my fourth year teaching during this event and I can say that this is the most enjoyable class I have taught. All the projects turn out right because with a diamond willow stick there is no wrong.

This year was the twentieth anniversary of Becoming an Outdoor Woman (BOW) weekend and was attended by over one hundred women who took various classes

learning outdoor skills like archery, shooting, Dutch oven camp cooking, backpacking, birding, map and compass, predator calling and my classes, carving walking sticks. Over Friday afternoon through Sunday morning each person had a choice of four, 3-1/2 hour classes they could choose and there were lots to select from.

Each person who took my class was provided a diamond willow stick, a knife and a small gouge as part of their fees for the weekend. They were taught the proper way to hold and use a carving knife and a gouge, and then they carved out the diamonds on the sticks, sanded and finished them, and put a BOW medallion on them along with a leather wrist strap.

All the ladies finished their sticks and were very happy to have a stick they could use for hiking. One woman who took my class three years ago told me this year that she used her stick to hike across the Grand Canyon and got many nice comments about her stick while on the trail.

Treasurer Warren Schlecht informed the group there was \$5,380 in the checking account with all bills paid with the exception of approximately \$900 for the rental of the Career Academy for the show. We have not yet received the bill. Motion to approve the report was made, and passed. Warren has a bill for an additional 35

Frank Koch reported the Career Academy has been reserved for October 10th and 11th, 2015 (the second weekend) for our show next year. Rooms have been reserved at the Comfort Inn again for next year and the hotel will provide a room free of charge for our Friday night social. It was discussed that a flag sign just have "Flickertail" printed on it. A retractable type would include pictures of carvings and some writing.
