Spring Class, May 6th-8th Carving, Culture and Art with Dennis Houle

On Friday May 6th, ten Flickertails and some interested public assembled in the garage of Dale and Jen Heglund for a class with Dennis Houle, recognized Lakota/Dakota artist, for a class in carving, culture and art. The room was set up with tables so that each member had enough room to do the various tasks.

Dennis was a good and knowledgeable teacher, and he came with examples of what the students were going to make. Each person could choose the items they wished to construct.

Some of the things that were available to create were a horse dancing stick, a gunstock war club, a general war club, a bison and a quirt (a short-handled whip with a braided leather lash).

Most of the projects started with carving and then sanding to get the shape right. Then some, like the horse dancing stick, required adding tufts of hair along the

mane line. Finally, you could add reins with beads, other accourrements, and coats of paint. While most of the other items being made didn't have the range of things you could add, they had some elements like paint and leather strips that would make them distinctive.

As with most of the Spring and Fall classes, there were lots of treats and Jen kept the crew well supplied with food. Sometimes, it was warm and sunny enough that the group worked outside in the driveway. About five people came and visited including the Pedigos and Ruth. Everyone seemed to be having a fun time putting the carvings together.

Dennis talked about the importance of the horse to the Native culture. It represented the freedom to move. Lakota/Dakota peoples traveled throughout the year. The horse facilitated transportation of households. It made hunting easier. It allowed the tribe to make war against their enemies.

There was a great amount of symbolism on the painting of a warrior's horse. An arrow on the hoof or lower leg was to encourage speed. A circle around the eye was for better sight. Some marks were painted on the horse's shoulders and some symbols were to tell that the horse had originally been stolen.

Bison were essential to the people of the Plains. They used every part of the animal. They ate the meat, tanned the hides for clothing and shelter, and used the sinew for many tasks. The bones made beads, ornamentation and gaming pieces, and some tribes converted the scapulae into hoes.

the participants on Friday and the other half on Saturday and Sunday. They are Masters in cottonwood bark carving. Each specializes in a particular style. One is more realistic such as the tower at Pisa While the other is more into Whimsey. They even fashion tree houses.


Becky W. began drumming up interest in summer activities, and had a sign-up sheet available for the Capital A'Fair demonstration table.
